This document details the steps needed to modify your **User Account Control (UAC)** for the following Windows operating systems:

- Windows Vista
- Windows 7

## **USING WINDOWS VISTA**

If your PC is using Microsoft Vista, in order for us to connect into your PC, you need to have the **User Account Control (UAC)** disabled.

- 1. Click on Start (Settings) Control Panel User Accounts.
- 2. Click on Turn User Account Control on or off.



**NB**: If the next screen displays a similar image to the one below with the tic box unchecked, then your UAC is disabled and no further action needs to be taken.

## **USING WINDOWS 7**

If your PC is using Microsoft Windows 7, in order for us to connect into your PC, you need to have the **User Account Control (UAC)** disabled.

- 1. Click on Start Control Panel User Accounts.
- 2. Click on Change User Account Control settings.



3. Drag the slider down to **Never notify** and click **OK**.



4. Restart your PC for these changes to take effect. Perform this task on all PC's that are to connect to TM2 Hosted.
